247.570	HB 3127	3	Amend	Requires medical certifiers and medical examiners to electronically report deaths to the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), Center for Health Statistics. Continues to require county registrars to notify county clerk of death reports within five business days and continues to require OHA and the Secretary of State to provide monthly death lists.
Effective January 1, 2026.

248.006	HB 3908	1	Amend	Increases party registration requirement to be a major political party from five percent to 10 percent of voters registered in the state.

Candidates; Recall

ORS	Bill No.	Section	Action	Synopsis
249.006	SB 580	1	Amend	<p>Requires county and city filing officers to update their website to include candidacy filing and withdrawal information and forms by the following deadlines:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Within five business days of receiving a nominating petition or declaration of candidacy: publish candidate name and the office they are filing for on county or city website;- Within two business days of determining candidate is qualified for the office: publish candidacy filing form on county or city website*;- Within two business days of receiving a withdrawal form: publish withdrawal form on county or city website. <p>If the filing officer does not make the information or forms available on their website, the filing officer must provide the information and forms upon request according to the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Must provide the information or form within five business days;- If record is provided digitally, filing officer may not charge a fee;- If record is viewed in person, filing officer may not charge a fee;- If a physical copy of the record is provided, filing officer may charge a fee in accordance with their fee schedule. <p>*This is the only requirement not applicable to candidates for Precinct Committeeperson (PCP). Filing officers must list PCP candidate names and withdrawal information on their website.</p>

Voters' Pamphlet

251.335	SB 578	1	Amend	<p>Establishes the timeframe during which a candidate or their agent may file a portrait and statement for inclusion in a county voters' pamphlet in primary and generally elections.</p> <p>For a primary election, the portrait and statement must be filed not sooner than the 120th day and not later than the 68th day before the primary election.</p> <p>For a general election, the portrait and statement must be filed not sooner than the 120th day and not later than the 70th day before the general election.</p> <p>Requires the Secretary of State to promulgate rules to establish the timeframe for other elections.</p> <p>Effective September 26, 2025.</p>
251.170	SB 1014	1	Amend	<p>Allows political parties to file translations of statement of argument filings. The translated statements of arguments must be in one of the five most commonly spoken languages in the state, other than English, as listed by the Secretary of State.</p> <p>Effective January 1, 2026, and applies to voters' pamphlets distributed on or after January 31, 2026.</p>

Campaign Finance Regulations; Election Offenses

260.057	SB 224	1	Amend	<p>Prohibits the Secretary of State from disclosing on the Oregon Election System for Tracking and Reporting (ORESTAR) the residence address of any individual associated with a Candidate Committee, Political Action Committee, or Petition Committee unless the individual directs the Secretary to disclose it. Residences addresses continue to be a public record subject to inspection under ORS 192.314.</p> <p>Effective January 1, 2026; operative January 1, 2027.</p>

3.012	SB 95	1-2	Amend	<p>Increases the number of circuit court judge positions in the 2nd Judicial District (Lane County) from 15 to 17.</p> <p>Increases the number of circuit court judge positions in the 5th Judicial District (Clackamas County) from 12 to 13.</p> <p>Increases the number of circuit court judge positions in the 16th Judicial District (Douglas County) from five to six.</p> <p>Effective January 1, 2026.</p>
3.050, 51.245	SB 166	65, 76	Amend	<p>Changes the terminology used to describe persons permitted to practice law in Oregon from “member” to “licensee.” Updates candidate qualifications to include updated terminology.</p> <p>Effective January 1, 2026.</p>
188.120	SB 952	1	Amend	<p>Changes process to fill a vacancy in the office of United States Senator. The Governor is required to fill the vacancy by appointment not later than 30 days after the vacancy occurs. The appointee will serve in the office until the end of the term or until a successor is elected and qualified.</p> <p>When a vacancy occurs, the Governor is also required to call a special election. The special election must occur between the 80th day and the 150th day after the vacancy occurs.</p> <p>Effective January 1, 2026.</p>
203.720, 221.210	HB 3687	1-2	Amend	<p>Prohibits a supermajority vote requirement for any amendment of a county or city charter. Allows counties and cities to amend their charters to allow supermajority, double majority, or other heightened vote requirements for revenue-generating measures or measures imposing or increasing fees, taxes, assessments, fines, penalties or charges.</p> <p>Effective September 26, 2025.</p>
